COURSE DESCRIPTIONS

MPF 107: FILM TOOLS AND APPLICATIONS

- This lecture and lab class introduces students to the concepts, tools, applications and foundations of filmmaking, including photographic imaging, exposure, cinematography, lab processes, lighting, film editing, and an introduction to digital editing. This course focuses on the visual aspects of silent film production.

MPF 323: FILM TECHNOLOGY I

- This course introduces students to theoretical and practical aspects of complex systems and equipment employed in production in both studio and location situations. It will include an examination of the entire sequence of production and post-production processes and the equipment and systems employed therein, including synchronous and non-synchronous systems in both shooting and post-production.

MPF 423: FILM TECHNOLOGY II

- This course introduces students to the theoretical and practical aspects of synchronous sound. Aspects of sound techniques include: double-system sound production; on-set production practices; issues in the synchronization of sound and picture; the foley studio, and mixing processes for film and television production.

FNWS 211: RESEARCH METHODS

- This course introduces students to various research practices, including oral history, interviews, case studies, archival and library research, survey/ content analysis and field-work. The emphasis will be on community-based participatory research within the context of a project designed and implemented by the class. Students will be expected to integrate the data from their investigation with what is known.

SOCI 200: THE NATURE OF RACISM

- This course examines the nature of racism and solutions to it from a historical, political, sociological, and cultural perceptive. This course will also look at race and culture as a social concept recognizing the impact of dominant majority group values, norms, and conflicting ideologies that inevitably lead to inequitable social and economic structures in Canada. Racism is analyzed by looking at how it is manifested in government, education, media, human services, employment, justice and law enforcement. Finally, the concept of democratic racism will be explored as well as the policies and practices that support or attempt to dissolve its existence.

CIFS 100: FRESH START STRATEGIES

- This is a non-credit course for students with 'Required to Withdraw' standing. It is designed to help students identify barriers to their academic success and address these barriers with targeted skill development, increased motivation and better insight about personal goals.


